PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE MEETING MINUTES

**January 20, 2021 - 4:00 p.m.
Via Zoom Meets**

CALL TO ORDER:

A meeting of the City of Clarksville Public Safety Committee was called to order by Chairperson Richard Garrett on Wednesday, January 20, 2021, at 4:00 pm. This meeting was conducted via Zoom Meets.

ATTENDANCE:

The following members responded to roll call and were connected to the meeting. It was noted there was a quorum.

APPROVAL OF ELECTRONIC MEETING:

In order to comply with the technical aspects of the Governor's Executive Order regarding holding open meetings in a forum other than in the open and in public, the Public Safety Committee determines that meeting electronically is necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens due to the COVID-19 outbreak.

Councilperson Richmond made a motion to approve the electronic meeting. The motion was seconded by Councilperson Reynolds. The vote for the motion to conduct this meeting by electronic means was approved unanimously by the Committee.

ADOPTION OF MINUTES

The committee approved minutes from November 18, 2020 meeting, November 30, 2020, special meeting, and from December 16, 2020, after a motion was made by Councilperson Richmond and seconded by Councilperson Reynolds.

BUILDING & CODES DEPARTMENT:

David Smith gave an overview of the department. He said we are not only in construction, but we have several divisions—code enforcement, administrative, and an abatement division. The administration division handles permits for new construction, subcontractor permits, and issuing all commercial permits for new construction; our commercial division handles zoning. The Board of Zoning Appeals is entertained by this office as well as in our commercial division. We employ roughly 13 construction inspectors to review the process of construction inspected for health and safety compliance. The code enforcement division looks at things like tall grass and junk cars. We have a number of employees that work in that capacity.

Mr. Smith talked about the fiscal calendar year 2020; we issued around 1200 new single-family permits calendar year 2020. That's a 30% increase over 2019 and a 90% increase over the calendar year 2018 to demonstrate single-family dwellings. This is to illustrate the growth that we're seeing. Note that our employee footprint has not grown in that time we've shuffled some personnel, we've diversified the skill sets of the employees we have. We haven't added any new employees to tackle that load of multifamily permits. We did 200 multifamily permits that are 30% over 2019 and a 250% increase over 2018. The commercial permits were down a little bit. They came down just a few percent over the previous two years, but the commercial is a tremendous driving factor. The code enforcement division does many cases month to month. Mr. Smith said if you have any questions, concerns about our practices, or what we do, please let him know.

FIRE & RESCUE DEPARTMENT:

Chief Montgomery gave an overview of the department. I have provided you with a packet that explains our numbers. For the year, we ended up with just over 14,000 runs; 467 of those were fires, with 93 being house or structure fires. We estimate that loss at about \$5 million. We had about 11,000 rescue related calls, which made up about 75% of our run volume. CFR also has a fire prevention division that tasks with fire investigations, cause determination, and public education. They average about 1200 inspections per year. We have 235 personnel right now, and at the beginning of March will have 250 personnel. We successfully secured a grant for that 15 additional personnel, which is 100% funded for three years. With that additional personnel, it will help us catch up to the city growth. We have 12 stations and three administrative facilities. At this time, we're building a maintenance facility. We have five divisions: administrative division, training division, fire prevention, vehicle maintenance, and fire suppression. And now we have a Swiftwater team that operates out of one of our stations, and also, we are setting up a tactical rescue team. All of these things will help us deploy faster and get resources where they need to be.

Chief Montgomery went on to say that they are restructuring their ranking system. We're doing that to get us in line with other emergency agencies. Still, we're going with a more district set up to help with our span of control and our response model, and we are successful in getting grant money to get the vehicles. In doing that, we will stand up a tactical rescue division, and that division will help us do the things that we hadn't been able to do in the past. Our goal is to meet the National Response standard, hopefully, move the city to an ISO one rating, and ensure that we remain an all-hazard mitigation Fire Department.

Councilperson Evans asked the question, what is ISO? Chief Montgomery said that it is an Insurance Service Rating, like a scoreboard for fire departments where they rate our performance and infrastructure.

POLICE DEPARTMENT:

Chief Crockarell gave an overview of the department. Clarksville Police Department is an accredited agency, and that is, as it stands, that's one of only 5% in the nation. It was 7%, and this summer, we were reaccredited for the fourth time in 2020. We are one of those agencies of only 5% nationwide. We're also state-accredited and have been since 2014, a lot fewer standards required, so this year we received our fourth award. We will immediately be preparing for our annual assessment that will come up this August. We are a full service police department. We also have dispatchers currently in the communication center. We are approaching with this fiscal year, allocated resources nearly 400 employees. Almost 70 of them are non sworn. So, with this allocation, 332 sworn police officers in this department. We have three policing districts. District one is the north side, and the downtown district is district two, and our third district is the St. B area. We are currently building a new precinct on International Boulevard right beside the fire station.

Chief Crockarell said that we compare our agency to the population by looking at a ratio of so many officers per 1000. We also need to take that a little further and bring a ratio into how many nonofficers we have in our department as support staff for those officers. For years, we've hovered around 1.9 to 2.0 officers per 1000. In this part of the country, I believe it's 2.7 officers per 1000 on average. We want to get to 2.2; the national average is 2.2 per 1000, so our hiring plan is robust to get to that 2.2/1000. We had a great 2020. For example, we hired 20% African Americans with a population, I think in the city is around 24%. So, you know, it will take us a long time to get to that number, but our goal is to mirror our population. We're a lot stronger than we used to be with our female officers, I guess a combination of challenges and goals. So when you're, filling your responsibilities, you'll spend a lot of time in the council meetings looking at rezoning cases. Please stop and remember that as you see this growth and you're approving these opportunities. As department heads, we need to keep up with that growth, so we provide a service. We're customer-based, and the citizens are our customers.

Councilperson Richmond thanked Chief Crockarell for his report and asked are the department heads present during the Regional Planning Commission meetings? Chief Crockarell said we have an officer there that attends those meetings. Councilperson Richmond also wondered if there is a council action to help resolve any concerns regarding rezoning. Chief Crockarell said I wasn't making a statement as if anything I said has anything to do with your choice on the rezoning approval. As our territories grow, there are more people within those territories that we serve. When I look at a ratio like 2.2 per 1000, it's just essential that we maintain that, and to maintain that ratio has a lot to do with the population itself, so if 1000 more residents move into town. We've got to make sure that our response time is where it needs to be, and the only way to impact the response time is to have more officers that can respond. Councilperson Richmond responded, thank you for that chief; that gives me a better insight into all areas' overall growing needs.

Chairperson Garrett said that as a follow-up, you mentioned the need for more officers and the shortage that we have, on average, we are looking at per officer entry level. Is it the set salary package that they get regardless of experience, or does it potentially vary in those considerations? Chief Crockarell said we will now start a cadet with no experience at \$40,000. They will receive training for twelve weeks in the academy. Then we require another 14 weeks of training with a training officer before they ever hit the streets solo, so before they go to their first call, they have to go through all that training. But once they finish our training, they go to \$42,049. So if you came from Nashville PD, we give you credit for five years of experience. So five years of experience and the adequate amount of training that we require you for the new pay study would start at \$48,000. So we're grateful for the step you all made for public safety.

CITY COURT:

Mr. Griffith gave an overview of how the City Court works; our job is to keep the court's records. We keep records of all the tickets for the Police Department, Fire Department for Buildings and Codes. And, the court's job is to disposition those charges whatever they might be. We also do many pretty important state reports. We have four clerks, actually five clerks, including myself, and we've been able to do that and maintain that number simply because we automate many things. And so we try to keep our costs down and keep our efficiency as high as possible. And so far, it's worked. The Tennessee Supreme Court has now stated that we can't have any in-person court until after March 31, which makes it a juggling act for us to maintain dockets at a level where they're just not uncontrollable. And we're trying a few different things, including zoom meetings. It's a process we are required by law to maintain records of all the citations, and we have to keep them for quite a long time. Mr. Griffith said if you have any questions or need any help with the court, we're always there. And always willing to help.

Judge Smith wanted to say hello, and as you're aware, Ernie Griffith and his folks do all the heavy lifting with court, and I'm honored to have the privilege to serve as City Judge. The number of citations is down, which is fortunate during this COVID epidemic. I don't know many of you new council members, and I hope we'll have a chance to meet each other, other than in the courtroom. So drive safely and avoid City Court.

COMMITTEE ACTION REQUIRED:

In a discussion of our regular committee dates and times, Chairperson Garrett said his understanding is that the meeting date for public safety is typically held on the third Wednesday of every month at 4 pm. All council members agreed to keep the dates and times the same. The next meeting will be on March 17 at 4:00 pm.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion to adjourn was made by Councilperson Evans, seconded by Councilperson Richmond, and approved by all at 4:36 pm.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF CLARKSVILLE AND THE TENNESSEE BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION RELATIVE TO THE TBI CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION DIVISION TASK FORCE

WHEREAS, the parties agree that this Memorandum of Understanding creates a mutually beneficial relationship between the City of Clarksville Police Department and the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation regarding the TBI Criminal Investigation Division Task Force; and

WHEREAS, the Clarksville Police Department will provide qualified officers to participate on the TBI Criminal Investigation Division Task Force; and

WHEREAS, the TBI will train each Task Force member under the TBI training program to assist the TBI in criminal investigations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARKSVILLE, TENNESSEE:

That the Clarksville City Council hereby authorizes a Memorandum of Understanding, attached hereto as Exhibit A, between the City of Clarksville and the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation relative to the TBI Criminal Investigation Division Task Force.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

DESIGNATING OFFICERS AS MEMBERS OF THE TENNESSEE BUREAU OF
INVESTIGATION'S CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION DIVISION TASK FORCE

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is between the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation ("TBI") located at 901 R.S. Gass Blvd., Nashville, Tennessee 37216 and the Clarksville Police Department (the "LEA") located at 135 Commerce Street, Clarksville, Tennessee, 37040.

WHEREAS, the parties agree that this MOU creates a mutually beneficial relationship by coordinating efforts between the parties.

WHEREAS, the LEA will provide qualified officers ("Task Force Members") to participate on the TBI's Criminal Investigation Division's Task Force. The Task Force Members will at all times remain employees of the LEA.

WHEREAS, the TBI will train each Task Force Member under the TBI training program for the Criminal Investigation Division.

WHEREAS, the Task Force Member will assist the TBI in criminal investigations. At all times during the investigations, the Task Force Member will be supervised by a TBI Agent. The Task Force Member will be utilized at the discretion of the supervising TBI Agent.

WHEREAS, the LEA's need for and use of the Task Force Member takes precedence over the TBI's need for and use of a Task Force Member.

THEREFORE, the parties mutually agree to the following provisions:

I. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- a. Beneficiaries. This MOU is an internal agreement between the parties and does not confer any rights, privileges, or benefits to any other party or to the public.
- b. Complete Agreement. This MOU reflects the complete agreement between the parties regarding this subject matter and supersedes any previous agreement related to the same subject matter.
- c. Severability. Nothing in the MOU is intended to conflict with current laws or regulations. If a term of this MOU is inconsistent with such authority, that term shall be invalidated, and the remaining terms and conditions of this MOU shall remain in full force and effect.
- d. Modification. This MOU may only be amended by the written agreement of both parties.

- e. Review. The parties agree to schedule periodic meetings to review this MOU, as needed.
- f. Termination. This MOU may be terminated by either party upon a thirty (30) day written notice delivered via certified mail to the other party.

II. SELECTION AND RETENTION OF TASK FORCE MEMBERS

- a. The LEA will nominate POST Certified officers ("Task Force Candidates") for the Task Force that fit the criteria set forth by the TBI.
- b. The TBI will evaluate all nominations. The selection of Task Force Members will be at the sole discretion of the TBI.
- c. The TBI will conduct a thorough background check of all Task Force Candidates. It will be the same background check the TBI uses when evaluating prospective new TBI agents.
- d. Task Force Candidates who meet selection criteria and complete all required training will be considered "Task Force Members." Task Force Members will, without additional compensation (except overtime as required by law), perform the duties as determined by the Director of the TBI or his designee.
- e. The Task Force Members will be committed to the program for a term of two (2) years.
- f. Task Force Members will be closely monitored by the TBI. The TBI may remove any Task Force Member from the Task Force for any reason and will inform the LEA's point of contact of the removal of the Task Force Member from the Task Force.
- g. The LEA agrees to provide to the TBI, before designation of each Task Force Member and on an ongoing basis, with respect to each Task Force Member, any negative performance information, or other information that may call into question the Task Force Member's truthfulness or ability to testify in court.
- h. Upon selection, Task Force Members will be required to sign a copy of this MOU, agreeing to its terms, and a Non-disclosure Agreement ("NDA"). The Non-disclosure Agreement shall be in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- i. A copy of this MOU and the signed NDA shall be kept at the LEA for review by Task Force Members at any time upon request.

III. TRAINING OF TASK FORCE MEMBERS

- a. The TBI will provide training regarding laws, policies and procedures to selected Task Force Candidates. This training will be provided at no cost to the LEA. Task Force Candidates who successfully complete this training will become Task Force Members.
- b. Upon successful completion of the TBI training program, the TBI will furnish each Task Force Member with credentials designating them as a TBI Task Force Member

IV. SCHEDULING OF TASK FORCE MEMBERS

- a. The parties shall formulate a mutually agreeable schedule that makes one Task Force Member available for Task Force duties at all times.

- b. When the TBI has a need for that Task Force Member, the TBI shall contact the scheduled Task Force Member directly with instructions.
- c. The TBI shall also advise the LEA Point of Contact that the Task Force Member has been called in to undertake Task Force duties and provide an estimate of the Task Force Member's availability to return to his or her regular duties at the LEA.
- d. The LEA's need for and use of the Task Force Member takes precedence over the TBI's need for and use of a Task Force Member.

V. TASK FORCE OPERATIONS

- a. The Task Force Member shall be supervised by a TBI agent and will follow TBI directives, policies, procedures and instructions when operating as a TBI Task Force Member.
- b. The Task Force Member is not employed by the TBI. The Task Force Member is an employee of the LEA.
- c. The Task Force Members will retain any and all law enforcement authority that they have been conferred by the LEA by which they are employed.
- d. Task Force Members shall use and maintain the same law enforcement equipment they use while performing their duties with the LEA including long guns, hand guns, handcuffs and other similar equipment. The TBI has the right to inspect all law enforcement equipment used by Task Force Members and the TBI has the sole discretion to determine that each item of equipment is safe and appropriate for the business of the Task Force.
- e. Task Force Members shall use only electronic equipment, including phones and computers, issued by the TBI while working on TBI Task Force business. Task Force Members shall not disclose any information contained on TBI-issued electronic equipment.
- f. TBI issued items, including electronics, shall not be used when a Task Force Member is not working on specific Task Force business.
- g. The Task Force Member shall immediately return all TBI-issued equipment and identification when a Task Force Member terminates employment with the LEA or when they are no longer a Task Force Member.

VI. COMPENSATION OF TASK FORCE MEMBERS

- a. The Task Force Members' salaries and benefits will be paid and provided by the LEA.
- b. TBI will reimburse to LEA up to \$10,000.00 in overtime costs per task force member per fiscal year. TBI's reimbursement is subject to funds availability. LEA shall submit the attached "Task Force Reimbursement Request." Any additional overtime due to be paid to the Task Force Members shall be the responsibility of and shall be paid by the LEA.

VII. LIABILITY

- a. The TBI does not employ any Task Force Member. Each Task Force Member is employed by the LEA.
- b. Each Task Force Member is covered by Workers' Compensation coverage through the LEA.
- c. Any liability incurred by the Task Force Member shall be borne by the LEA.

VIII. TERM

- a. This MOU becomes effective when approved by the TBI and the LEA as evidenced by the latest date of signature below and remains in effect for a period of ____ years unless modified or terminated as defined under Section I. of this MOU.
- b. This MOU will automatically renew for periods of one (1) year unless, prior to the date sixty (60) days before the end of the then-existing term, the party who wants to cease automatic renewal gives written notice of that fact to the other party.
